G/F, 3 Yiu Wah Street

Coco Chanel meets Hello Kitty. Here you'll find one-of-a-kind apparel and accessories imported from Japan, all inspired by Coco: cropped tweed jackets, sailor tops and quilted bags.

Rue Madame

St. George's Building, 2 Ice House Street

7 ON LAN Street

D-Mop

G/F & 1/F, 11-15 On Lan Street

D-Mop carries fashion-forward labels such as Matthew Williamson and Ann Valerie Hash - plus, concept shoes. No classic 3-inch stilettos here. Just bold and daring.

Harvey Nichols

The Landmark, 15 Queen's Road

So hip and so downtown, Harvey Nichols must have the highest concentration of heavy-metal studs in Hong Kong. Look for exclusive up-and-comers like Prabal Garung, Katy Rodriguez, Black Halo, etc. Note: Stop by the cafe on the fourth floor for a nice long lunch.

Joyce

New World Tower, Queens Road.

Lane Crawford's edgier and more upscale cousin. The downstairs is for deep pockets: Balmain, Oscar de la Renta and McQueen. Founded by the Hong Kong fashion doyenne Joyce Ma and recently acquired by the Lane Crawford group, don't miss the comprehensive accessories section which recently absorbed On Pedder, known for carrying Jimmy Choos and an eclectic collection of costume jewelry.

Kwanpen

Shop 211, The Landmark, 11 Pedder Street

This Singaporean brand brings you impeccable exotics in classic styles. A Hermès aesthetic without the Hermès price tag. Pair with giant South Sea pearls for maximum effect.

Lane Crawford

Shop 3025-26, ifc mall, 8 Finance Street

THE local upscale department store. Selections range from youthful, such as the American Apparel pop-up shop and Kate Moss for Topshop line, to the downright haute, like Lanvin and Herve Leger. The IFC branch is best thanks to a world-class lingerie section, interesting visual merchandising, and a full-time DJ at the coffee bar.

Manolo Blahnik
SHOP 203, 2/F, the Landmark, 15 Queen's Road
Shoe heaven. This flagship is the only distributor of Manolo's in Hong Kong. Channel your inner Carrie.

Milan Station
G/F, 26 Wellington Street
Barely used designer handbags sold at this favorite Hong Kong chain. Check out all the latest Pradas, Guccis, Balenciagas that the Hong Kong socialite sells off after 1-2 seasons!

Rupert Sanderson
8 On Lan Street
Shoes you need -- not want. Rupert Sanderson's first store outside of London is run by a boyfriend-girlfriend team of ex-bankers. (So Hong Kong!)

Sabina Swims
1/F, 99F Wellington Street
Hong Kong-based Chinese-American designer Sabina Wong churns out quirky mix-and-match swimsuits in colorful prints.

Shanghai Tang
12 Pedder Street
The original chinoiserie: classy and never kitschy (a rare thing!). You'll find luxurious modern items with an Asian twist, such as understated mandarin-collar cashmere sweaters for guys or lambskin clutches for girls. The Central flagship location also has a made-to-order section for all your sexy cheongsam needs.

The Swank
shop 312 - 214, The Landmark
Famous for catering to Chinese mistresses, The Swank carries luxury labels such as Roberto Cavalli and Marchesa. Everything is colorful and over the top - very celebrity-event worthy. Choose carefully if you are none of the above.

Twist
G1 Floor, M88 Wellington Place, 2-8 Wellington Street
Twist is a Hong Kong favorite for discounted luxury goods. You'll find everything from off-season Marc Jacobs to Balenciaga to Prada.

1/Fl, 9 On Lan Street
The hidden jewel of On Lan street. (Be sure to look up as it's not on ground floor!) Its owner designs her own line of edgy basics, Among Strangers, and carries up-and-coming designers such as Ohne Titel and Josh Goot.

A home store with furniture small enough for Hong Kong apartments. Great for unique souvenirs such as vintage-print cheongsams.

29 Gough Street
A rubber eraser ring? Check! A furry lamb sculpture? Check again. Homeless houses items that can add a little bit of quirk to any apartment.

41 Staunton Street
Adorable lacy silk lingerie collection flown in from London. Present is designed like a boudoir and located in the heart of SoHo.

50 Wyndham Street
Italian designer Chiara designs her own line of ethnic-inspired yet modern jewelry. She also imports items from Italy. Truly a unique experience.

Spy Henry Lau

21 Staunton Street

Hong Kong designer Spy Henry Lau creates trendy streetwear for men and women. Everything from extreme wash jeans to rhinestone-studded cocktail dresses.

58-60B Peel Street

Visit this tiny shop for deeply discounted designer clothing & accessories. Hong Kong's secret stash of factory seconds.
